Materials and methods

Provide sufficient details to allow the work to be reproduced by an independent researcher. Methods that are already published should be summarized and indicated by a reference. If quoting directly from a previously published method, use quotation marks and also cite the source. Any modifications to existing methods should also be described.

Head2: use this style for second order headings

Text: normal and font 12, left justified. Indent the first line of each paragraph (0.5 cm). Do not add a line space between paragraphs.

Head3: use this style for third order headings

(no space between heading and text. Text begins on next line)

Use this style for fourth order headings (left justified, bold font 12 followed by a full stop (period)). Text continues on the same line.

Results should be clear and concise.
